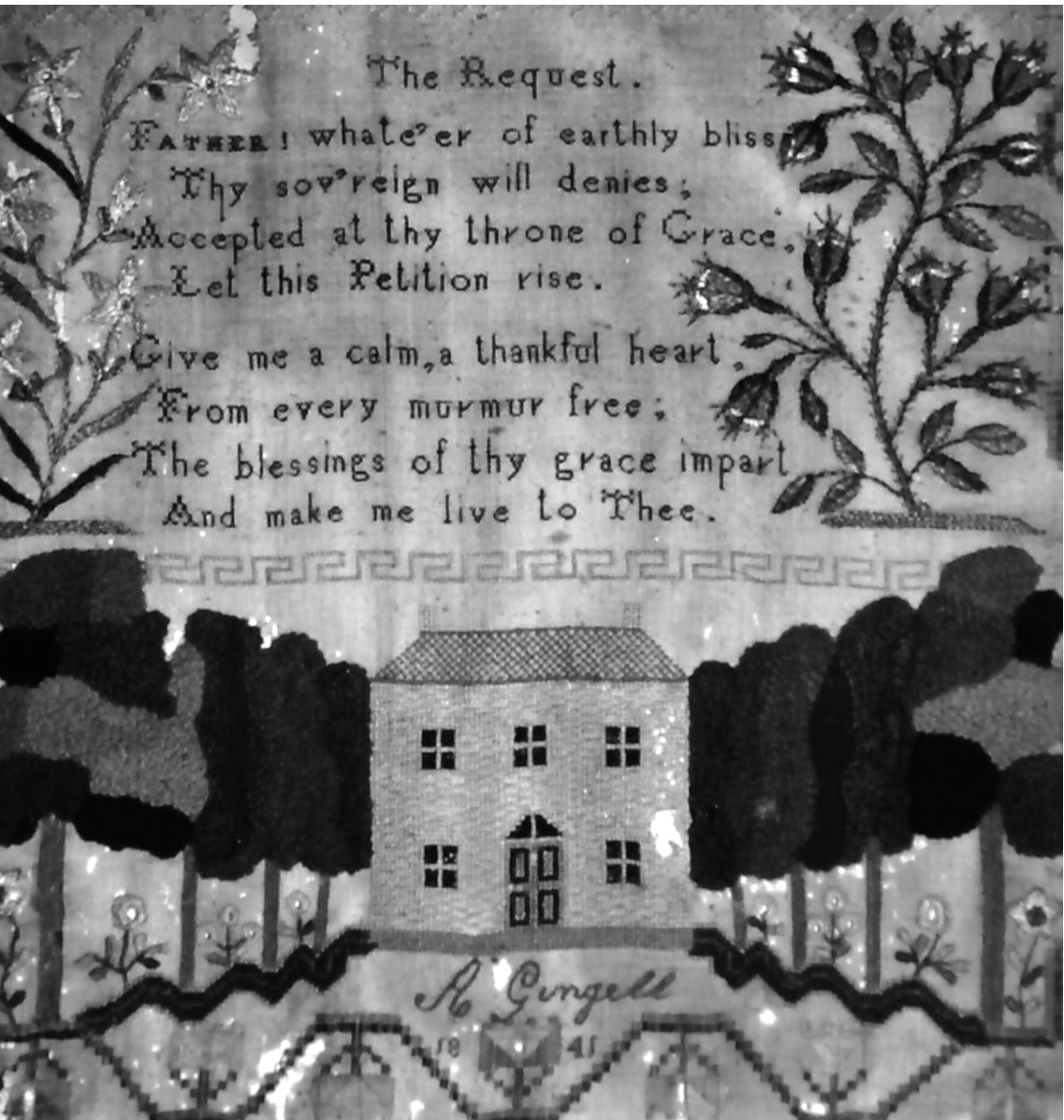

Nympsfield in Bloom

Back in the last century (twenty years ago!) Nympsfield used to enter "Britain in Bloom" and we did really well winning the Regional Competition in 1997 and 1998, and just missing a hat-trick of wins by coming second in 1999. Nevertheless, a trace of the former glory lives on in the form of the sign hidden in the weeds at the entrance to the village.

No pressure, but there's still a chunk of money in the bank if anyone would like to take it on again for 2020. Any of the former organisers will, we are sure, be happy to give advice on what is needed if anyone would like to resurrect it. It would be lovely to see the village covered in flowers again.

Old News from Nympsfield

- A Ducie Story

Coming off the M5 at Falfield and meaning to get home via Charfield and Wotton, you'll see one of those brown "tourist" signs saying "Tortworth Court and Arboretum".

Ian Crossland investigates....

It turns out that the arboretum was created in the late nineteenth century by the third Earl of Ducie (resident of Tortworth Court) in friendly rivalry with Robert Holford of Westonbirt; apparently the two arboretums (arboreta?) were then of comparable size and interest. That's no longer the case – Westonbirt far outclasses anything else in the country let alone its locality. That said, there are some fine and unusual trees at Tortworth and, even better, it's free!

Of more interest than the arboretum is Tortworth Court itself – now an hotel. This was built by the 2nd Earl of Ducie for whom the architect Samuel Sanders Teulon produced plans in 1849. Ducie had only recently (1845) sold his

extensive holdings of land in Nympsfield, Frocester, Woodchester and Horsley to William Leigh so it's more than likely that he used the one to fund the other.

Tortworth was an early commission for Teulon (he was 37) and he really went to town in Gothic style with a massive central block – like a Norman keep – surrounded by smaller castellated structures and towers. A feature of his design was an arch on the driveway, close to the house, with the word "Welcome" in large stone letters.

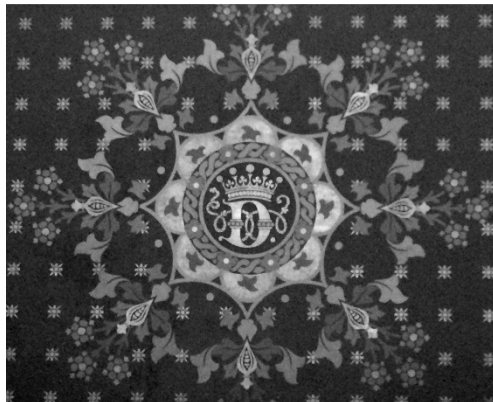
Following this, Teulon went on to do much work in the district including Owlpen House (demolished 1955) and the rebuilding of both St Giles' church Uley and our own St Bart's. According to the 1999 edition of "The Buildings of England" (Verey and Brooks) he was mostly responsible for the Village School and Schoolhouse, and the Coach House at the Old Rectory. It struck me that he might have been a contender for William Leigh's new Woodchester Mansion but then I discovered that Teulon (of Huguenot stock) was an evangelical Christian making him, for the Catholic Leigh, a non-starter.

The Ducie family had first come to Tortworth in 1610 when Sir Robert Ducie, Lord Mayor of London, bought the Manor of Tortworth with its park. Sir Robert had lent and lost vast sums of money to King Charles I – for which he

was made a baronet - but still, somehow, managed to remain a very wealthy man. He added to his estate over succeeding decades so that, by his death in 1634, he'd bought up most of the manors around Tortworth and – an outlier - Woodchester. A hunting lodge in Woodchester Park was rebuilt as Spring Park Mansion some time before 1750 and the family decamped there, using it as their main residence for most of the next 100 years. When they left, the original mediaeval manor house back in Tortworth (Old Tortworth Court which still stands by the church) was not grand enough - too small and low - hence the call to Teulon.

The new Tortworth Court was home to the Ducie family until the start of the Second World War when it was requisitioned by the Royal Navy for coding and signals while the family moved to another house on the estate, where they still live. After the war, the Home Office took over, using the war-time buildings in the grounds as Leyhill open prison – understandably, the “Welcome” sign was removed. The house itself was used for training prison officers until it was sold with 10 hectares of land in 1987. A severe fire occurred in 1991 and, ten years’ later, it was converted to a hotel. I’m pleased to report that the “Welcome” sign is back in place. After my initial visit I went back more recently and had afternoon tea in the dining room whose ceiling is decorated with the Ducie monogram. The grounds are beautifully kept and, while they still have a prison as a next-

door neighbour, it is only visible from the driveway and, even there, screened by a thick hedge. Given its chequered history and the fate of many other country houses such as Owlpen House, it’s a small miracle that Teulon’s work is still there for us to see at all.

An afterthought: any Mancunians in our midst may be wondering whether there is any connection between Great Ducie Street and Ducie Avenue in Manchester and the Ducie family of Tortworth. Well, yes, there is and, in fact, part of the current income of the Tortworth Estate comes from ground rent charged to lease-holders in that fair city. The connection goes back to the 18th century when, by marriage, the Ducie family acquired Strangeways Hall. In the mid-19th century this was sold to establish the Manchester prison of the same name; in so doing, it oddly anticipated the 20th century change of use of Tortworth Court.

NYMPSFIELD PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The Nympsfield Annual Parish Meeting took place on 13th May, 2019 at the Village Hall. There were no members of the public present. Reports of the past year's activities were presented by chair of Nympsfield Parish Council Cllr Elizabeth Sturgess and Stroud District Councillor for Nympsfield Cllr J. Dewey (both of which will in due course be available on request from the clerk).

It was immediately followed by the annual general meeting of Nympsfield Parish Council at which chair Cllr Elizabeth Sturgess and vice-chair Cllr Susan Cowle were both re-elected. Two letters each signed by several residents had been received about the relocation of the war memorial. It was agreed that serious consideration should be given to this matter. Cllr Cowle was going to get back to the correspondents and Cllr Sturgess was to speak to the owners of the house where the memorial was currently located. She was also to discuss the issue with the people who looked after The Barrow which was the location identified as being suitable for the relocation.

The council was now able to move to co-option of a new member after no request was received for an election following a member's earlier resignation. The seat remains vacant and expressions of interest in the role would be welcomed and can be made via the clerk.

An application for financial support from St Joseph's Out of School Club was met with a decision to grant £500.

The 10th June, 2019, parish council was inquorate (did not have enough members present to legally proceed) and so was cancelled at short notice. All business including approval of the Annual Governance and Accountability Return for the government appointed external auditor was therefore carried over to the July meeting.

Next meetings second Monday in the month at 19:30 in the village hall.

PARISH CLERK NEEDED!

A permanent Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer is required by Nympsfield Parish Council.

The main duties will include the preparation of agendas and attendance at monthly evening meetings, the writing of minutes and implementation of decisions taken/actions decided; also conducting the council's financial affairs from control of banking and accounting arrangements to preparation of records for audit and VAT reclaims.

Training will be given through the Gloucestershire Association of Parish and Town Councils, leading eventually to the Certificate of Local Council Administration qualification.

The successful candidate will be required to work from home for 21 hours a month with necessary equipment – laptop, printer and mobile phone – provided, and should be IT proficient.

Salary will be negotiable but within the National Association of Local Councils 2019 scale range LC1 (13-17).

Spams & Scams

Action Fraud has experienced an increase in the reporting of malicious calls and voicemails, to members of the public purporting to be from Her Majesty's Revenue & Customs (HMRC). Fraudsters are spoofing genuine HMRC telephone numbers to deceive their victims over the phone. The fraudsters state that as a result of the victim's non-payment of tax or other duty, the victim is liable for prosecution or other legal proceedings in order to settle the balance. The fraudsters suggest victims can avoid this, by arranging payment to be made immediately by methods such as bank transfer or by purchasing iTunes gift cards.

If the victim is hesitant or refuses to comply, the suspect makes a threat such as immediate arrest, sending bailiffs to the victim's address or, in some cases, deportation.

Often, the period for which the tax is allegedly due is distant enough to guarantee the victim will have little, if any, paperwork or ability to verify the claims. Once the money is paid the suspects sever all contact with the victim.

In genuine cases, HMRC will initially make direct contact with you via post/letter and potentially follow up that letter with a phone call at a later date.

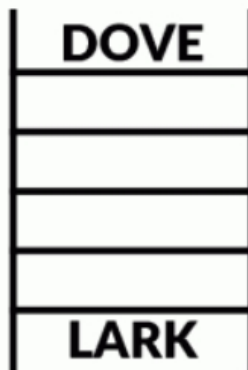
If HMRC contact you via telephone they will quote the reference number on the initial letter you should have received. HMRC will not discuss something you are not already aware of, like a tax investigation, and will **NOT** demand immediate payment.

Rose's Recipes

From the Hetty Pegler Cookbook of the last century (with updated units)

Whacker's Chocolate Crunch.

8 oz / 225 g margarine

1 cup / 240 ml oats

4 oz / 110 g sugar

2 tsp cocoa

8oz / 225 g plain flour

Chocolate or icing sugar for topping

1 cup / 240 ml desiccated coconut

Mix flour, cocoa, sugar, and margarine in a bowl until a dough is formed. Add the oats and coconut and press into a greased 12" by 7" / 30 x 18 cm tin. Cook for 25 minutes at 350F / 180 C. Cut into fingers and leave in the tin to cool. Top with melted chocolate or icing. Coffee powder can be used instead of cocoa. This freezes well.
