FAREWELL TO THE MARIST SISTERS

As announced in the previous issue of Nympy News, the Marist Sisters are leaving at the end of October after ninety years in the village. They first came at the invitation of the Misses Leigh. The convent building – originally built by their grandfather William Leigh as an alms-house was known in the village as The Barracks. It is shown on a 1920 map of the village as a War Orphanage. Later, it was gifted by the elder of the two sisters to the Marist Order with the condition that, if they were ever to leave, it would be passed on to another religious order or, failing that, would become home to some other charitable body that was doing good works in the community. As you might expect, the lawyers are trying to puzzle that one out. Sr Alexius, who is remembered as a splendid head teacher of St Joseph's School, is now in her eleventh decade.

OLD NEWS FROM NYMPSFIELD

Not a Bad Air Day

These days cartographers of the Ordnance Survey mostly rely on satellite photography and computers; not so long ago it was a pen and paper exercise with the detailed information coming from soldiers who made notes and sketches in pocket-sized "boundary books" specially issued for the purpose; these were supplemented by "name books" that list the correct names and spellings to be entered onto the maps. The instructions from the Survey were that "For names generally the following are the best individual authorities, and should be taken in the order given: Owners of property; estate agents; clergymen, postmasters and schoolmasters". Is this the only time that an estate agent has been considered to be more trustworthy than a vicar?

No longer needed by the Survey, all these documents are now kept at the National Archives at Kew. Looking through the ones connected to Nympsfield a couple of years ago I found an old letter placed loosely in the file. It was dated 15 September 1933 and was written by Bryan H.StJ. O'Neil, Inspector of Ancient Monuments, to O.G.S. Crawford, archaeologist to the Ordnance Survey. O'Neil said that he'd been to see the Nympsfield Long Barrow and thought that he may have found another one - this one unrecorded - close by. He provides not very accurate figures for its latitude and longitude but, helpfully, someone has added a sketch map which

allowed me to find it quite quickly: if you are interested it's located close to the big five bar gate into Stanley Wood on the Stroud Road (B4066), about 75 yards east of the Buckholt junction. There's not a lot to see: a mound about one metre high and maybe six or seven metres diameter with a couple of trees growing out of it. The location is perfect: were it not for the trees it would have an uninterrupted view of the Severn. It looks man-made to me but whether it's a long barrow is a different matter. Its absence from present-day maps suggest that O.G.S Crawford was unconvinced although, other than the little sketch map, there is nothing to show that it was actually investigated. That's the problem with unsuccessful research - it rarely gets written up.

Nympsfield aside, O.G.S. Crawford (1886-1957) (first name Osbert known to his friends as Ogs) was a very successful researcher. He made his name as a user and promoter of aerial photography in archaeology, coming to the idea after working on aerial reconnaissance on the Western Front during the First World War. His classic paper used R.A.F. photographs to map what he called "Celtic fields" on Salisbury Plain. Typically, these are an acre or so in extent and rectangular with boundaries indicated by raised banks. Local examples are rare. The name is disliked by archaeologists although its replacement, "ancient field system",

hardly has the same ring. It's thought that they could have been created anytime between the Bronze Age and the departure of the Roman legions.

A big disadvantage of aerial photography is that trees often get in the way. Also, where the features have low relief. one may need the sun to be low in the sky for them to be seen and, even then, the shadows cast by nearby trees - in hedges for instance – can interfere. A new technique - Lidar (light detection and ranging) - overcomes many of these problems using laser beams shot from an aircraft to detect quite subtle differences in ground elevation. And now we have a Lidar map that covers much of the country. You can find it by Googling "UK Lidar map". The part covering Nympsfield looks to have been produced about


ten years ago – before the silage clamps at Court Farm were demolished. There's much of interest to see: the possible long barrow at Buckholt is clearly visible despite the trees; surrounding the village there are many vestiges of ridge and furrow cultivation – this is the mediaeval method of cultivation that survived until the eighteenth century – none of which shows up on existing aerial photos. But most exciting of all is an indication of Celtic fields in the heart of the village on the Knapp. It looks as though the five acres of The Knap could, in ancient times, have been sub-divided into three or four separate fields.

The significance of this is that, for the first time, we may have evidence of prehistoric occupation of the area where the village now lies – as opposed to the

burial sites on the Cotswold edge.

Re Mod Cons: The 28th August 1964 was a very hot day in Nympsfield. I was sitting in Church Cottage, where we lived then, with our young Austrian friend, Marli, who used to come over in summer to help with the children. They were all out somewhere playing, and Chris, my husband, was at work in Avonmouth.

I was pregnant and all at once I realised I was in labour. I wondered how I would get to the hospital in Stroud. I tried to think of anyone who would drive me. But Marli was already out of the door. She ran round and down to Front Street and approached the foreman who was overseeing the men digging the trench preparing for the main sewer.

"Leave all that!", Marli commanded. "You've got to drive Anthea down to Stroud. She is in labour". Well, he did. Possibly the fact that Marli was very attractive had something to do with it. The poor man drove very fast and was very nervous, but we arrived safely and the next day, Ben* was born. *Sadly, Ben died aged five months. He is buried in a corner of St Joseph's churchyard.

Nympsfield People

The May-June edition of the Nympy News saw an appeal on behalf of **Carys Hellewell** who was suffering from Gastroparesis and Vascular Compression Syndrome. This meant that she had not been able to eat properly for years. The appeal was for £40,000 to allow Carys to travel to Germany for treatment there. Eventually, with help from various local sources, crowdfunding and a local charity, Carys was able to reach her goal: she flew to Dusseldorf for an eight hour operation at a clinic there. This was successful and, although there were complications later, she is now on the mend – her doctors say it will take a year to make a complete recovery.

"I had been waiting to get to this stage for so long that it seemed impossible" Carys said. "Thank you so much to everyone that has supported me through this, I now have a chance at life". Our best wishes to Carys for a speedy recovery. [Acknowledgements to Stroud News and Journal].

NYMPSFIELD PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

At the September meeting we were pleased to welcome PC Lay, Beat Manager covering the Dursley and Cam. PC Lay had been invited to the meeting to provide an overview of the police presence in the community. He advised that due to staffing issues there has been no police presence for the last 2 years. However, a new PCSO, Anne Barker, has been assigned to cover the Nympsfield area. PC Lay was pleased to advise that in the last 12 months only 9 crimes have been recorded, (3 of theft which were not residential burglaries). This reflected favourably compared to other local areas, such as Horsley reporting 47 crimes, 3 of which were burglaries. PC Lay suggested that lack of crime in the Nympsfield community may well be its geographical position which has poor access/egress from an intruder perspective.

Cllr Cowle highlighted the issue of dangerous parking outside St Joseph's when children are being dropped off at school and PC Lay advised that he would investigate this concern and report back to the Council.

At October's meeting Cllr Dewey reported the planting of trees in the Stroud area to create a woodland to help mitigate climate change. This follows the planting of a further 100 trees last year in Stratford Park. On 3rd October Stroud District Council (SDC) also approved a proposal to plant a woodland of 5 acres on the former Stratford Park estate on the eastern side of the A46. Cllr Dewey also reported a meeting "SDC Against Plastic" being held on 19th November at 7.30m at the Crown, Uley.

Other issues raised at the meeting related to the relocation of the War Memorial, modifications to the new gate into The Glebe and pot holes on Tinkley Lane.

The Council has been approached by Rosemary McCloskey, Rural Project Officer, Stroud District Council who wishes to carry out a sustainable drainage project (Natural Flood Management) on the Miry Brook. Rosemary wishes to tap into any local knowledge on anyone who is living next to the Miry Brook. 
Spams & Scams




Scammers now have the technology to mimic an official telephone number so it comes up on

your caller ID display (if you have one on your phone). This can trick you into thinking the caller is really from a legitimate organisation, such as a bank or utility company. If you're in any doubt, hang up and call the organisation directly. If possible, call them from different phone as scammers can keep the phone line open, so that, even if you hang up and call the organisation directly, the line may still be connected to the scammer. If it's not possible to use another phone then wait for at least 10 minutes before you call. A local resident recently received a phone call from a plausible-sounding man claiming to be from the Metropolitan Police Fraud Squad. He said that her credit card had been found and that, immediately after speaking to him she should hang up and then call a landline number he gave her. When the resident said she'd have to speak to someone else first, he slammed the phone down.

Clearly he was not with the police and the landline number he gave was false. His intention was that, when she called back, she would be connected directly to his accomplice who, no doubt, would try to talk her into giving up her PIN number – and who knows what else?
