

Nympsfield Village Hall Meetings

To be held at Nympsfield Village Hall on 6 December 2022

7:30PM: VILLAGE MEETING RE VILLAGE HALL

Background

It is proposed to re-develop the Village Hall in order, amongst other things, to provide disabled access and toilets and to upgrade the kitchen. Having regard to the potential personal trustee liability which may arise from letting a building contract for the re-development, a Charitable Incorporated Organisation called Nympsfield Village Hall CIO (the "CIO") has been created to take over the existing charity. The CIO will hold the Hall for the same charitable purposes as the existing charity and will be managed by trustees as is the case now.

The Agenda for the meeting will be:

- Presentation and question and answer session concerning the redevelopment of the Village Hall
- 2. Presentation and question and answer session concerning Nympsfield Village Hall CIO
- 3. To discuss and propose resolutions to approve:
- 3.1. the transfer of Nympsfield Village Hall by the existing holding trustees to the CIO;
- 3.2. transferring Nympsfield Village Hall to the CIO and not the Official Custodian for Charities; and

3.3. dissolution of the existing unincorporated charity of Nympsfield Village Hall

Notes:

- A. A covenant in the conveyance dated 30th March 1966 required the Village Hall to be transferred to the Official Custodian for Charities but this was never done. The Charity Commission's authority to the transfer to the CIO will be sought on the basis that it is not necessary to transfer the Village Hall to the Official Custodian.
- B. Following dissolution of the existing charity, the Village Hall will be held for the same charitable purposes but by a different entity.

The ECO column



Lots of people in the UK and around the world are growing their own vegetables with the no dig method. Have a go! [it works for me – ed] The satisfaction of nurturing your soil, sowing your seeds and harvesting healthy veg to eat is so good for your physical and mental health, and it's good for the environment too.

- Better drainage so less flooding
- Better moisture retention so less water needed for more food
- No need for synthetic inputs which harm soil life, such as artificial fertilisers
- Less slug damage in my and others' experience
- Soil is always covered, with compost on beds and wood material on paths, and most of the time with growing plants
- Carbon is retained in the soil (from an article by Charles Dowding)

OLD NEWS FROM NYMPSFIELD

Gerry Bowen dug out an old copy of Saga Magazine from 2004 which told a strange tale from the Civil War. A little internet research revealed that the story comes from a document in the Bodleian Library that was collected by Dr Robert Walker when he was writing his book "The Sufferings Of The Clergy Of The Church Of England During The Great Rebellion" (published 1714). It seems that Walker sent a circular letter to the clergy, especially in the southwest, asking for their stories of the Civil War, by then, 60 years in the past. This is one of them, spelling and punctuation have been updated.

In the time of that unhappy war which began in the year 1641 between the best of Kings Charles I and the worst of men, the rebellious Parliament, there was only envy, hatred and malice and all uncharitableness in this distracted kingdom. Murder and plunder was too common. I was at that time 26 years old and was taking a journey from Northleach where I lived to Dursley about 20 miles distant, in the month of November with an Irish horse under me.

The days being short and the evening dark I lost my way and came to a place called Nympsfield. Here was an inn where I lodged. After supper the innkeeper did tell me there was a garrison of the Parliament at a place called Eastington 4 miles north towards the city of Gloucester.

I went to bed and fastened the chamber door. About 10 or 11 o'clock I heard a great noise. About 20 foot soldiers came from the garrison at Eastington with their muskets and in a violent manner broke open the door, took all my clothes and in an unseemly manner made me leave the warm bed, and out of the chamber, down the stairs, into the cold air, only my shirt loose about me.

The innkeeper hearing how I was abused by them rose in haste and ran to them saying, "What do you mean to do with him? You go the way to starve him. Give him his clothes to put on him, for pity, for shame!" Their answer was, "He is a Cavalier, and we are resolved to make him go to our garrison with us as the soldiers did from Cirencester to Oxford, that is, naked."

Thus being in the midst of these Roundheads about 11 of the clock in the dark night, naked from the sole of my foot to the crown of my head, only my shirt loose about me, they were making haste to bring me to their garrison, my tender feet treading upon the cold ground. The soldiers that followed me were ready to tread upon my bare heels to force me forwards. In this manner they had me forward nearly a mile from the inn. I began to think that this is the last night that I have to live, and I did desire Almighty God to be merciful unto me and to enable me to undergo with patience

whatsoever affliction should be laid upon me.

And now man's necessity is God's opportunity. It pleased the Lord to put into the heart of one of these soldiers being more pitiful than the rest, to ask me, "What is your name: whither are you travelling?" I told him my name and that my journey was to visit my mother's sister that lives in Dursley. He asked me "What is your mother's sister's name?" I told him that her name was Bridget Everet. He said that she was an honest woman, and one that he did respect, and that for her sake I should go back to the inn again. Seeing me in such a naked condition he went to one of the soldiers that had my doublet, he took it from him and gave it to me saying, "Put it on, you must needs be very cold and make haste to the inn again." I gave him thanks for had it not been for him that cold night, I should have been starved to death or murdered. The rest of the soldiers went away with my horse and with all my clothes but my doublet and shirt.

I was glad that I was at liberty and I went with as much speed as I could to the inn again. The innkeeper called to the maid to rise quickly and make a good fire to warm me – and to take a cloth and wipe the dirt from my feet, and seeing me naked from my hips downwards, only my shirt between my legs, the maid put off one of her petticoats, and she gave it to me saying, "Put it on to hide your

nakedness." I went to put it on the wrong way. She took it from me and put it over my head saying that was the way to put on a petticoat. When I had well warmed myself I called for a pair of slippers to go to bed again.

That I was thus used, or rather abused, by the Parliament soldiers in the year 1643 witness my hand.

Signed: Robert Rowdon. Born the 17th May 1617 – now in the 92nd year of my age. 1709.

That soldier that took pity upon me did say to some of my relations at Dursley that had it not been for him, when they had brought me something further from the inn, they would have beaten out my brains with their muskets and then have left me. From battle, murder, sudden death, and from civil war, which is greatly to be feared good Lord deliver us. Amen

In the year 1643, the King dined at Northleach at my father's. When the king was in his house many poor people prayed to the King that clothing might go forward, for they could not live without it. I heard the King say, "Alas, poor people, how can I help you when I cannot help myself?" This I heard the King say.

ELECTRICITY

Everyone will be aware that the cost of electricity and heating oil have gone crazy. A few ideas for keeping bills down:

- Turn down the thermostat by a degree (or half a notch on radiator valves)
- · Wear a jumper!
- Don't heat rooms that aren't used much, and keep the doors to them closed
- Put "snake" draught excluders across the bottom of doors
- Seal any obvious draughts
- Replace lightbulbs with LED lamps (if I turn all of the lights on in our house, we're still using less than a couple of old 100 W bulbs!)
- Look at alternative heating methods: I've just put an infrared panel into an
 otherwise unheated bathroom on a delay timer, which gives very rapidly a
 feeling of warmth and doesn't cost much to run.
- Check the temperature of internal surfaces using an infrared digital thermometer to see what needs attention. You can get them for not much over £10.
- We're investigating whether we can get a thermal imaging camera to survey the outside of houses and look for hot spots where heat is escaping (or where hydroponic farming is taking place!)

Nature Notes by Miss Daisy SQUIRRELS

You either love them or hate them, depending on whether you are a gardener, or not.

At this present time these furry grey rodents are busy digging little holes in our beautiful green lawns to hide nuts for the hard times to come in the winter. They often dig pretend holes just to confuse another watching squirrel, but also they often forget where they have buried them, so are unwittingly planters of many oak trees.

Grey squirrels are natives of north America and were deliberately brought over to the UK by the Victorians in 1876. There are now 2.5 million of them.

They eat acorns, beechnuts, hazelnuts, sweet chestnuts and walnuts – also flowers, shoots and plant bulbs. As a gardener it is very disheartening to find that they have been busy digging in my carefully planted pots of bulbs and primroses etc. but I have recently discovered a way of deterring them, by putting sprigs of holly on top of the pots. They definitely avoid these as they do not like the prickles!!!! Similarly, if you put peanuts out for the birds during the winter months, it is an expensive and annoying sight to see the squirrels gobbling them up. I am told that chilli powder is very good as whilst the birds are immune to it, the squirrels hate the hot peppery taste. You can buy squirrel proof bird feeders, but they are very crafty little creatures and will eventually find a way in – even chewing through metal bars of a caged feeder to claim their prize. A friend of mine says she has great fun watching squirrels continually trying to climb up the pole of her bird feeder, which she has liberally greased with Vaseline!!!

Sadly, the lovely red squirrel is almost extinct in the UK. As the greys are much greedier they have all but wiped them out, apart from the Isle of Wight, some parts of Scotland and Brownsea Island. The red squirrels are also prone to a disease called squirrel pox, which the greys have become immune to.

Squirrels build nests called dreys way up in branches of the trees and their young, which are called "kits" are born blind and hairless – they depend entirely upon their mother until they are about ten weeks old.

They have very few predators [I have a recipe - ed] so it seems as if we have to learn to share our gardens with these grey furry creatures and just have to try to be one step ahead of their cunning little ways.

It has been an eventful period. There was great sadness for the loss of our wonderful Queen, and hope and well wishes for the new reign of King Charles the Third. Nympsfield Parish Council have had one meeting only to report on. Resubmitted plans for the development of the Lodge House at Woodchester Park were objected to by NPC. This despite a well-received presentation of the proposed changes by the owners. No objection was made however, to a proposed development at Close Hill. The Defibrillator course took place in the Village Hall on October 14th. 11 of the 12 slots were taken up and a very worth-while session took place. Attendees practiced the deployment of a defibrillator and learned emergency CPR technique. NPC hope the attendees now feel empowered to use the machine in an emergency and feel able to tell their friends and families about it. The statistics are stark – the chances of surviving a heart attack without a defibrillator are slim. Quickly applied, use of a defibrillator improves survival rate roughly 10 fold.
