OLD NEWS FROM NYMPSFIELD

No Mod Cons

One hundred years ago, Nympsfield had neither mains water nor a main sewer. Drinking water came from wells and at least one - the Four Wells on the Holloway (just below the Cook's house) acted as a public supply. Contamination of drinking water by sewage was a known hazard and households were required by law to have a sanitary method for sewage disposal. Mostly, this consisted of a hole in the ground (a cesspit) where solids would collect (to be dug out and carted away periodically) while liquids would soak away, relying on so-called "self-purification", i.e. destruction of pathogens by microbial action in the soil, to clean it up before it reached the groundwater below - and the wells that drew from it. If a cess pit was too deep, that could leave too little soil and rock to effect the clean-up.

Cholera epidemics were not unknown in the district and in 1914 the Dursley Rural District Council (RDC) came up with a Nympsfield Sewer Scheme that was discussed at the Annual Parish Meeting that year. Villagers, worried by news of infectious diseases in Dursley and elsewhere, were keen to take up the offer and the meeting voted in favour. But the Chairman, Rev Van Den Burgh, was not convinced and he eventually brought the meeting round to agreeing to send a deputation from the village to the RDC to discuss three "difficulties" with the proposal.

The first of these was "a deficient water supply"; put another way, clean water

was the most important priority and how useful was a main sewer anyway if houses did not have water on tap? The second problem was "the Outfall"; the minutes of the meeting don't explain what this means but my guess is that sewage was meant to drain by gravity to the lowest point in the village (in the field just below the Plain probably) where there would be a holding tank with an overflow to an artificial soakaway – in effect, a very large septic tank. The third and final issue - no surprise here – was the cost: this was estimated at £313 of which one third would be chargeable to the parish. Given that the parish rate only raised £10 per year, one can understand the concern.

Two months later, the deputation reported back on its meeting with the RDC. By now, the village had changed its mind on the idea and no-one could be found to second a motion to accept the RDC's proposal. Instead, swayed by the Rector, it voted to say that

This meeting is satisfied that under its present healthy conditions and with its excellent health record, the village is sufficiently well served by the existing drain, and respectfully asks the RDC to let it remain as it is. If through neglect, defects have arisen, it invites that proper repairs be executed.

The Rector noted in passing that the well at the Barracks (now the Convent) had been mentioned incidentally in connection with the drainage scheme, but that no official statement had reached him from the RDC – at least in writing. In other words there was a possible health hazard with the Barracks well but not to worry as he'd only heard about it off the record.

The RDC wasn't to be swayed so easily and ordered a report from the district Medical Officer. This was passed back to the village for "observations" but, by now, it was September 1914, a month after Britain had declared war on Germany. The MO's report was read to the village meeting whose response – again led by the Rector was to call for

the RDC to suspend ... any action in the matter [given] the unsettled state of the Country and the prospective call up on its resources Meanwhile the continued health of the village is, they think, a sufficient guarantee that the present system of drainage is of no danger to the health of the inhabitants.

This did the trick: the scheme was put aside for the duration of the war and then quietly forgotten. Instead, in 1933 the village began lobbying for the RDC to bring mains water to the whole village. This was finally achieved in 1940. One of the reasons given was that the Four Wells was known to be contaminated. This, of course, undermined one of the arguments the village had put forward for deferring the sewer scheme but, by then, all that had been forgotten.

Mains sewerage took longer to come to the village and arrived piecemeal: first at

an unknown date to Cockadilly where, presumably, it was easy to route the effluent down towards treatment works that drain to the Severn. Next, as part of the development of the Tinkley Corner Council Houses in 1950; and, finally, to the whole village around 1967. By this time the electrically-powered pump house on Baker's Lane was in use to push the material up to the lip of the escarpment so that it could then flow downhill to the treatment works — as it still does, fatbergs permitting.

Woodchester Park:

From Emma Guthrie of the National Trust: I am emailing to let you know of some felling work that we will be undertaking at Woodchester Park from mid-September. We are going to be removing an area of non-native Western Red Cedar trees as part of our parkland restoration work. The work will take approximately 2-3 months depending on the weather, and for this time a large part of the purple walking route will be inaccessible to the public for health and safety reasons. We will be putting diversion signs in place to allow walkers to still do a circular route through the park. However, we are aware of the disturbance this will still have, especially to the local community who use the park regularly.

There's a new gate at the entrance to the village green near to St Bartholomew's.



NYMPSFIELD PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The July meeting was attended by a dozen members of the public concerned about plans for 10 new dwellings on land opposite The Hawthorns, The Plain. The proposal for four flats and six houses prompted a wide-ranging debate which clearly showed both local people and the parish council's objections to the idea. Protests included the number of units, their location, and its sustainability next to a large working farm.

The site was also not that identified in earlier surveys. The council objected in the strongest possible terms about it to the Stroud District Council local planning authority. The proposal has now been "called in" which means the SDC members instead of their officers will determine the application.

The council's Annual Governance and Accountability Return was approved for submission to the external auditor. It showed total spending of £7,894 against a precept (income) of £7,642 during 2018-19. There are however balances moving forward of £14,409.

In August the council co-opted new councillor Peter Tomiak-Baquero to fill its vacant seat. New clerk Ms Susan Black was also welcomed following interviews held at the end of July for the permanent clerk's vacancy.

It was agreed Vice-chair Cllr Susan Cowle would now take forward negotiations with bus operators Stagecoach about use of the stone bus stop in the centre of the village following the council's dissatisfaction with Gloucestershire County Cllr Loraine Patrick's liaisons on the matter.

A new firm was engaged to cut the grass at The Cross, The Barrow and Cockadilly junction. This would be experimental and subject to later review.

It had earlier been resolved to attempt to relocate The Cross from private householders' land to The Barrow because its roadside position meant both damage to the war memorial and hazards for worshippers. Cllr Cowle would see if permission could be gained from the War Memorial Society before any practicalities are discussed.

Rose's Recipes from the Hetty Peglar Cookbook of the last century

Old School House Chicken Topping serves 4-6

34 lb cooked chicken

1 onion

14 lb mushrooms

½ pint Bisto

Pinch of herbs

Leftover stuffing and vegetables

Topping

8oz flour

a good 4 oz shredded suet

Dice the chicken into an ovenproof dish. Fry the mushrooms for a few minutes and add to the chicken with the herbs and leftover stuffing and vegetables, pour over the Bisto. Make the topping by mixing the flour and suet with enough water to make a soft dough. Drop in the middle of the chicken and spread out with a fork until it reaches the edges of the dish. Cook for 30-40 minutes until brown and crispy on top, at 425F.



Emails to the Editors

From Frank Wooldridge, Chair of the Nympsfield Playing Field Committee:

There has been some confusion recently about charges imposed for use of the village playing field; I am writing to set the record straight.

While the playing field is a community facility provided for the benefit of all, it does not look after itself. Mowing is the main expense but this, thankfully, is mostly paid for by the Parish Council. This aside, the main outgoings are for pavilion and field maintenance, insurance, utilities, additional mowing etc. These are met from fundraising activities and from fees collected from hirers and event organizers. The normal charge for a half day's use of the whole of the field is £65. When St Joseph's School wanted to use the field for a whole-school picnic recently, the committee proposed a charge of £26, a substantial discount on the normal fee, in recognition of it being for a school event. The school balked at this, however, and the committee subsequently came in for some criticism and abuse. The committee takes the view, nevertheless, that the proposed charge was very reasonable given that others pay the full amount.

The 5 Churches Walk
