

## **Nature Notes from Miss Daisy**

#### NE'ER CAST A CLOUT TILL MAY BE OUT

This is an old English proverb which was first documented in 1732 but it was passed down by word of mouth long before that.

But what does it mean?.....

Since at least the early 15<sup>th</sup> century "clout" meant warm winter clothing, so the message is basically "Don't take your warm winter clothing off until May is out"

But here lies another puzzle......(and the Jury is still out on this one)

Does it mean the month of May, or does it mean the may blossom (also known as hawthorn) which often comes into bloom around the middle of April.

Personally, I think the beginning of June is a long time to wait before taking off an itchy woollen vest, but you make up your own mind.

"HERE WE GO GATHERING NUTS IN MAY" is another ancient saying, but again another puzzle, as there are no nuts to gather in May. It refers instead to an ancient tradition of young people gathering "knots" (or bunches) of the maytree blossom. This usually took place on May eve and the bunches would be given to the people in the village to commemorate the beginning of spring, and the start of new life. Young people also gave them to the young woman or the young man they were hoping to marry.

Dancing round the maypole on May Day was a long held village tradition but sadly, it is seldom practised today. It is believed that this was passed down from Roman times, some two thousand years ago, when Roman soldiers would dance around a decorated tree to give thanks to their goddess Flora and to celebrate the start of spring.

Finally, I am sure you will have heard of the tradition of young ladies bathing their face in dew early May-day morning. This is said to ensure a beautiful blemish free complexion for the rest of the year, but ME, I think I will stick with the Oil of Ulay!!!!!

## **NEW DEFIBRILLATOR AT THE BARROW**

With the help of the purchasing power of the parish council, we have a new Automated External Defibrillator, or AED, located at the Barrow just outside the Club. Thanks to all who helped get it installed, including (but not limited to) Tony Ind for sorting the electrics and for Ter Smith and colleagues at the club for the connection to their supply.

## WHAT HAVE WE GOT?

It's a HeartSine SAM 500P Semi-Automatic Defibrillator from the British Red Cross.

## WHO CAN USE IT?

Ideally it should be used by persons who have been trained but, because they will often not be available in an emergency, it is designed so that it can be used by the general public. It talks to you through the procedure, including where to apply the pads to the bare chest (below left breast and above right) so it should be useable by anyone.



## WHEN TO USE IT (OR NOT)

It is intended for use on persons suffering cardiac arrest: the patient must be:

## UNCONSCIOUS

## **NOT BREATHING**

# WITHOUT CIRCULATION (no pulse)

# Do not use it on a patient who is conscious or responsive.

## Sudden Cardiac Arrest

Sudden cardiac arrest (SCA) is a condition in which the heart suddenly stops pumping blood effectively due to a malfunction of the heart's electrical system. Often victims of SCA have no prior warning signs or symptoms. SCA also can occur in people with previously diagnosed heart conditions. Survival from SCA depends on immediate and effective cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR). This includes "mouth to mouth" and chest compression if you've been trained or chest compression alone if not – see

The use of an external defibrillator within the first few minutes of a SCA

can greatly improve a patient's chance of survival. Heart attack and SCA are not the same, though sometimes a heart attack can lead to an SCA. If you are experiencing symptoms of a heart attack (chest pain, pressure, shortness of breath, tight feeling in the chest or elsewhere in the body), immediately seek medical attention.

## **Treatment by AED**

It is a common misconception that CPR alone and calling emergency services is enough. CPR is a temporary measure that maintains blood flow and oxygen to the brain. CPR alone will not return a heart to a normal rhythm. The key to survival is defibrillation – and the sooner the better. Defibrillation is a common treatment for life-threatening arrhythmias, mainly ventricular fibrillation.

Defibrillation consists of delivering an electrical shock to the heart with a device called a defibrillator. This restores normal heart muscle contractions and allows normal rhythm to be restored by the body's natural pacemaker in the heart.

It is important to note that cardiac defibrillators, like this one, will only administer a shock if it detects that the patient's heart is not working.

#### Accessing the defibrillator:

- The defibrillator itself (including the pad-pak) is housed within a soft-carry case, which is, in turn, housed within the large external AED cabinet.
- Currently, the cabinet is not locked (*this may change – if it does the village will be circulated and instructions placed on or near the case*). To access the defibrillator twist the plastic green cover. A (relatively quiet) alarm will sound to indicate that the cover has been opened. The defibrillator can then be simply taken off the shelf.
- The defibrillator is portable and can be easily carried to the location required.

THIS DESCRIPTION IS NOT INTENDED AS A DETAILED MANUAL ON HOW TO CARE FOR A PATIENT. MORE INFORMATION CAN BE FOUND IN THE MANUAL (see link below).


## Using the defibrillator in an emergency:

This defibrillator is used to monitor the heart rhythm and to quickly deliver a defibrillation shock if needed to a victim of sudden cardiac arrest (SCA). A short video demonstrating use of the defibrillator can be found using this link: https://uk.heartsine.com/support/aedtraining-videos/ or

Pages 16-20 take the reader step by step through the process. This manual is detailed, and includes a labelled diagram of the defibrillator. Whilst I recommend reading it in full, the video summarises the process well. Using the defibrillator on Children (1-8yrs)

- This is also detailed in the user manual, see link above.:
- Note, the defibrillator comes with two types of pad-pak (the pad-pak is a single-use removable cartridge that includes the battery and the two electrode pads, in a single unit). The adult pad-pak is currently installed into the defibrillator and is grev in colour. If the patient is 1-8 vr old, the rescuer has the choice of placing the pink paediatric pad-pak into the defibrillator before turning it on (this paediatric pad is stored within the blue back-section of the soft defibrillator carry-case) or continuing with adult pack. The adult pad-pak can still be used on a patient who is 1-8yrs old, but you should ignore the voice prompts regarding rates of CPR.
- When using the pediatric pad-pak, the CPR advisor function is disabled, so that whilst the rescuer is prompted to begin CPR in time with the metronome, they won't receive CPR advisor feedback (e.g. on the amount of force to use).
- Note the positioning of the pads for children of 1-8yrs is different. The user manual shows the two recommended placement options.



#### **Defibrillator CPR advice:**

- This machine provides guidance for the rescuer, to ensure effective CPR is delivered.
- The defibrillator will provide a metronome to help you maintain a good rate. The machine will also monitor the victim (through the electrode pads attached) and provide feedback (e.g. force and rate) on the CPR being delivered. See the user manual for details and a labelled diagram of the defibrillator.
- Maintenance: The pads are single use, and must be replaced after use. Please let me or another member of the Parish Council know if the pads are used so we can order new ones.

If anyone notices that the "Status Indicator" (see labelled diagram in user manual) is no longer flashing green, please let me or another PC member know. Some of you may have seen gaggles of children over the school holidays hanging out at the woodland alongside Elcombe Woodyard on Bath Road and wondered what was happening. Well.... since Christmas 2016 I have been slowly but surely creating a fantastic space for children to explore the great outdoors, make connections with nature, learn how to use traditional hand tools and making the most splendid and imaginative things out of wood.

Having taught at secondary schools and worked with young people for over 20 years now, I started Raffles Forest School back in October 2016, when I moved to the area. The woodland site has developed over the years and is now a safe haven for children and pheasants alike!

I know that St Joseph's Catholic Primary School offers fantastic forest school opportunities in their curriculum time so I know that some of you are aware of the forest school ethos. It's not just playing outdoors with sticks... well it is... but is also a way of learning about the natural world. Children learn to use tools to make toys and shelters... using natural materials they can find. Children gain experience of new skills, such as knots and knife skills, making campfires and basic cooking skills. Children explore the natural environment and habitats, investigate animal life, insects, plants and trees. They are allowed to get mucky and have fun... all in a safe and friendly woodland!

I can honestly say I love my job! I think young people are amazing and can achieve great things when given an opportunity to thrive. I feel very luck to work with some lovely people and live in such a beautiful place.

I wanted to take this opportunity to introduce myself and now that things are opening up a bit more, if you are driving passed and see the campfire is lit, come in and say hello!

#### **OLD NEWS FROM NYMPSFIELD**

## Fit for a King

As we have seen recently, a royal death can stir deep emotions. The death of George V in 1936 – only a year after his silver jubilee – was no different. The King had, after all, been a source of continuity and good sense through a period that included the most fearful war that the world had seen and, with it, the rapid changes in society that continue to this day. As described in "Memorial to a King" by Sir Campbell Stuart (1954), a committee was set up by the Lord Mayor of London to raise funds to build a statue and to establish а "philanthropic scheme" to benefit the whole country. Ideas considered were Youth Hostels. Medical Research, Cottage Homes for the Aged, National Parks and Plaving Fields.

The committee consulted the Royal which was already closely Family associated with the National Playing Fields Association (now Fields in Trust). The King's younger son, the Duke of York (soon to become George VI), was then its founding president and the promotion of youthful physical fitness was said to have been close to the King's heart notwithstanding that his chief pastimes had been shooting game birds and philately. Incidentally. the Roval connection to Fields in Trust continues to this day with Prince William taking over from the Duke of Edinburgh in 2013. No great surprise, then, that the committee opted for the playing fields scheme.

Using the formal language of the day, it decided:

(1) That the funds available for a philanthropic object should be devoted to the establishment throughout the United Kingdom of open spaces for the playing of games and physical recreation.

(2) That these open spaces be directly associated with the memory of the late King by being named 'King George's Fields', and that a memorial gateway of uniform pattern designed by an eminent architect be erected as the chief entrance to each of them.

King George's Fields Foundation was established to bring the scheme to reality while a National Memorial Fund appealed to the public for money. It was hoped that the public response would be generous but it was too much to expect that the sum raised would stretch to purchasing hundreds of suitable plots of land up and down the country. Instead, the Foundation decided to use the money as grant-in-aid, calling on local authorities and private individuals to purchase or donate suitable land and offering grants for any work needed to adapt the land for its new purpose. Land donated was to be dedicated in perpetuity for recreation and to be called King George's Fields. Gate posts were to be erected at the main entrance using suitable local materials and each one was to have a specially-designed heraldic shield, supplied by the Foundation, fixed to it.

The appeal seems to have resonated with the public: according to Sir Campbell Stuart, when the fund closed in 1948. it had reached £584 thousand (around £21 million in today's money). Most of it (95%) went to the playing fields and some five hundred schemes were approved amounting to 4507 acres. The grant-in-aid policy seems, in particular, to have been a great success generating seven times its own value.

Gloucestershire we In find King George's Fields at 20 different locations – Gloucester is a notable absentee but the local council may have judged that the 27 acres of Gloucester Park was enough. Nympsfield has its own field courtesy of the Misses Leigh who, ever patriotic and mindful of their public duty, donated six acres on Tinkley Lane in March 1939 at a cost to them of f439. By means of a conveyance, the field was handed over to three trustees: Rowland Daniels, Bernard Stribbling and Jack Wooldridge. They were followed by a string of successors of whom the longest serving was probably Bernie Freeman. The trustees were - and still are - assisted by a Playing Field Committee that organizes and charges for the bookings, keeps the field in good order and raises funds for maintenance, insurance and so on. It aims, in the not too distant future, to extend and refurbish the pavilion which was probably built in the 1960s using 'free' village labour - much like our wonderful ex-bus shelter.

Not much to report, our NHS vaccination programme is going well with a lot of people getting their second doses and (at the time of writing) first doses going to over-45s. If you're over 45 and/or clinically vulnerable and haven't had an invite, either contact you GP or try the national booking system https://tinvurl.com/nhsc19booking



(worth looking soon if you're in a younger age band).

You can now pick up the less-accurate lateral flow test kits locally to test yourself. They should be available at Lloyds chemist in Old Market, Nailsworth or in the pharmacy in Sainsburys at Dudbridge, plus Boots and May Lane surgery in Dursley. Although false positive results are rare (around one in a thousand) with the current low level of infection in the area it is quite possible that a positive result is false, and must be checked by the more accurate PCR test (call 119 to make a booking).

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## From him indoors

There was a Nympsfield connection on BBC TV's local news (Points West) last month. A piece about the Bristol Blenheim bomber that came down near Quedgeley in 1940 told how, after both engines failed, the pilot, Flt Lt Robert Coventry, a Canadian, bravely stayed at the controls, crash-landing the plane in a field to avoid hitting a school (photo of the wreckage below). Flt Lt Coventry was killed and is buried at Down Hatherley. Quedgeley Town Council has commissioned a memorial with the hope of unveiling it later this year. The two other members of the crew survived, one of whom was our own George Wilcox, radio operator and gunner, who was rescued from the plane – via a hole in the fuselage – by local people. George (inset photo in his RAF uniform) died aged 102 in November 2018.
