



OLD NEWS FROM NYMPSFIELD

Mixed Blessings

The comedian Arthur Smith says The Archers is the only programme that he's compelled to switch off - even if it means getting out of the bath. One sympathizes but, as a Radio 4 addict, it's sometimes difficult to avoid listening. What I notice recently is plenty of talk about government policy turning farmers into land managers rather than food producers. It's not surprising: a recent blog from the Natural History Museum said that the UK is one of the most nature-depleted countries in Europe and the fall in biodiversity continues despite efforts to reverse it.

A wonderful new book, English Pastoral: An Inheritance, by James Rebanks gives some insight into how this has come about. Rebanks, it may be remembered is the shepherd who told his own story of life on a Lake District fell farm in The Shepherd's Life: Modern Dispatches from an Ancient Landscape. His latest book paints a picture of the family farm and the changes that have occurred there over the last three generations. He describes his much loved grandfather, whose working practice, tractors aside, had hardly changed since the 19th Century. It was a mixed farm with sheep and cattle alongside pigs, hens and, some years, geese to be sold at

Christmas. Much of the land was on the fells so that the main business of the farm was sheep rearing. The number of sheep that could be kept was dictated by how many could be fed through the winter - these were the breeding ewes supplemented by a few rams to serve them. The old man grew barley and turnips on his best land – and hay of course – for winter fodder so, ultimately, the size of the core flock was decided by the acreage of good land where he could grow these crops. Things appear to have been OK in the early days - the 1960s but the price of sheep and cattle fell over the years so that the farm made progressively less money. Even so, Grandad's self-sufficient approach meant his outgoings were small and, with children flown, he and Grandma were content to live in near poverty. The compensation: he was his own man and "doffed his cap to no man".

When Grandad died, the farm passed to James's father who was farming on rented ground not far away. He couldn't live the way his father had – he had a family to support. In buying more land he accumulated more debt but the selling price of sheep and cattle continued to fall and it was difficult to keep up with the interest payments. The only way out was to bow to the market: increase the number of animals by turning every inch of land over to grazing, use nitrogen fertilizer and improved seed to make the grass grow quicker and replace the turnips and barley with industrially made feed. The pigs, hens and geese had to go, hedges were grubbed up. The result: no longer a mixed farm but a monoculture.

The outcome of this specialization was disastrous for the wildlife on the fell farm. Curlews, which had previously been the commonest farmland bird there started to disappear in the 1990s: they couldn't lay eggs and rear chicks in fields that were mowed three or four times each summer. These birds can live up to 30 years and, for years after these agricultural changes were introduced, they would linger on in fields where they had previously brought up their young. One of the least productive fields on the farm was partly covered in gorse which, of course, had to go. But, along with the gorse, the flocks of linnets and yellowhammers that had lived there disappeared also.

What happened quickly on that Cumbrian farm 30 years ago mirrors what has happened over the past 70 years - and continues to happen - in the rest of the country. The question is 'how to stop it?' Nobody wants food to be more expensive but doing nothing is not an option. Special payments to farmers to incentivise environmental schemes have long been a favoured approach for government but they don't seem to have had much impact to date. After his father's death, James Rebanks took over the farm and has done much to restore some of the old habitats including putting in wooded areas (which have to be protected from the sheep) alongside the streams. He says that he's on the highest



possible environmental subsidy and this accounts for one third of his farm income. It may not be enough - if we want to improve biodiversity, it seems that one way or another we are going to have to pay for it.

Bus Timetable Changes

Since our last edition there have been a few changes to the bus timetables from the village; some good, some bad.

There is now only one bus to and from Cam & Dursley railway station, not Saturdays. There are fewer early and evening buses. On the plus side, there is an occasional service via Dursley to Stonehouse and Gloucester (the latter takes about 75 minutes).

The Saturday service is much improved.

I think the ticketing has become cheaper: a return ticket to Stroud used to cost and arm and a leg, but there's now a "day rider" ticket for £4.00 (£3.80 via the Stagecoach app) which covers all travel in the Stroud and Dursley area (I suspect that doesn't include the bus to Gloucester but am open to correction –I've got a bus pass anyway!) There are also West Explorer tickets (£7.50 / £7.00) which cover all of Stagecoach West, and an 853 Gold Rider (£10.00) which covers all of Gloucestershire and Oxfordshire.


*Operated by Cotswold Green: the buses going to Coaley do not stop at Cam & Dursley station. BBC TV's "House Through Time" has been telling the history of 5 Grosvenor Mount in Headingly, Leeds. A recent episode (number three in the current series) featured Percival and Rose King, who were from the Stroud area – their daughter Phyllis was born in Rodborough in 1917. Later records suggest that Phyllis was not a well child: it appeared that she needed constant care.

In the 1920s, Percival took his family from Stroud to Leeds - one cloth manufacturing area to another – and became involved with the development of artificial silk, known as rayon. By the mid-1930s, he was lecturing on the subject in Leeds and it was then that the three moved to Grosvenor Mount, an up-market address. Tragically, though, Percival became progressively more poorly with mental illness and, finally, was committed to a mental hospital from which he escaped to drown himself in 1938; his age was only 54. The programme speculated that his illness may have been caused by carbon disulphide – a chemical used to make rayon - which is known to damage the brain and cause a range of physical and mental conditions including severe depression. Quite possibly, Percival could have been exposed to this chemical in his work bringing about his early illness and death.

The year after Percival's demise, Rose and Phyllis moved back to Gloucestershire. Sixteen years later, Rose died leaving Phyllis, now aged 37,

alone. The programme researchers searched for her through electoral rolls and newspaper archives but could find nothing until they found a funeral notice on the internet which spoke of a funeral held at St Bart's church Nympsfield for Phyllis King, late of St Jude's Care Home. The film crew came

MISTLETOE

Probably the last thing you want to be reminded of when reading this, is that Christmas is on the horizon! But there is no escaping the fact that in a few short months, we shall no doubt be eating too much, drinking too much, and probably spending too much money!!!

Hopefully, though, this year, it will be a much happier Christmas for all of us – unlike last year, when we were in the grip of the pandemic and a great number of people had to abandon their festive plans to isolate in their own homes.

Before "bling and glitter" were invented, many people would decorate their homes with holly, ivy, fir trees and of course mistletoe – and there are some interesting facts to be found on the mistletoe plant...... "Why do we kiss under the mistletoe, rather than a bunch of holly?"

In Pagan times the white berries of the plant were a symbol of male fertility, whilst the Romans regarded it as a symbol of peace and love – hanging it over doorways to protect the household.

In the Christian era however, it became associated with Christmas – as a decoration under which lovers are expected to kiss - and the earliest reference to mistletoe tradition in popular music was in the 1952 hit "I saw Mommy Kissing Santa Claus" which was recorded in the US.

Interestingly it is the floral emblem of Oklahoma and the official "flower" of Herefordshire.

For 22 years now we have struggled to keep our daughter Molly well. Just lately we have been at a loss with how to help her, with professionals telling us this could be as good as it gets. Moll is 22 she sits in her chair all day every day asleep or in pain. I do not accept that this is how it is, she deserves a good life like our other 3 children So I will do anything in my power to try & get the best and newest treatments available.



The Biscuits book series has been in my head for a long time. Duncan Biscuit was the first character probably thought up about 20 years ago. I've previously published an art therapy book with wellknown guest artists to raise funds for my Molly's fix me fund in 2018. Thankfully it was a big success buying her a powerchair an oxygen machine & other treatments she needs. Molly was born with a life-threatening illness which was not discovered until she was 14. This has left her very poorly. Lack of treatments in lockdown & the whole terrifying experience of worrying we may lose her if she caught covid was over whelming. I started sketching out the characters to keep my mind off the horrible reality & fear that covid bought us in the early days. I wrote a few stories & then spent about a year illustrating the first book. Molly couldn't leave the house for over 18 months, so it was a good opportunity to finally get it done. When finished I sent the first draft & illustrations to my dear friend the lovely Jilly cooper to see what she thought. She has been a big encouragement to Molly & I & helped out with my first book.

To my utter surprise Jilly sent it to her agent which gave me so much confidence in getting it published () although Jilly's agent specialises in adult literature it gave me so much encouragement to pursue the idea. I've been an illustrator for 30-ish years, so I know how tough breaking into something like this is. In April Mr Richard Tea was published by MT publishing. I'm currently working on Custard Queen which will hopefully be out at Christmas time.

I'm amazed by the great 5* reviews it has had, and I really hope the Biscuits become a thing. All proceeds are going towards Molly's treatment & care. I'm hoping to get her to Harley Street soon to have an adrenal pump fitted. This Is the same pump as a diabetic would use but giving life sustaining cortisol instead of insulin. Molly currently takes 4 tablets a day to keep her alive. She is having huge problems with side-effects from them at the moment which makes her feel even more poorly so the adrenal pump will be of massive benefit to her. It will hopefully give her a more normal & awake life. Unfortunately, it is not on the NHS as Molly's condition is 1 in 100,000 & it's a relatively new treatment. The pump with all related costs will be about £5000.

For our reception, their first year at school in their bubble with their teacher and remote assemblies is all that they know of school. It had taken some adjusting for them to come in through the main school gates with the rest of the school, come into assembly, having lunches in the hall, share the playground and the field with the rest of the school. The staff watched at the first break time as children came excitedly out of school and stopped, unsure of what to do, questioning was it ok to be on the field all together? After a frozen moment in time, it did not take long for their play spaces to be forgotten and for all the children to be enjoying the school field, playing together. Coming together as a school is probably the thing that we all missed the most last year. We still had whole school assemblies on TEAMs, but it is not the same. It has been so lovely to be able to go to Mass again this year. When we held our first hymn practise, we were shocked that the children couldn't remember some of their favourite hymns. But of course, the last time that our current Year 6 would have

been in a hymn practise, they would have been in year 4. With a bit of work and commitment from the children to REACH in all that they do, it didn't take long before they were singing just as well as they have always done. There are of course some measures still in place, classrooms are still well ventilated, children still regularly wash their hand throughout the day and use anti-bac hand gel, each class still uses their dedicated toilet and sink - this has become the norm. Parents evening was still on TEAMs so as to avoid mass gatherings at school. Children are all dropped off at the school gates in the morning and their parents come onto the playground to collect them in the afternoon – leaving quickly. We have unfortunately, like many schools around us, have had several cases of covid in the last couple of weeks. We have been caught up in the positive LFD, negative PCR situation. Thank goodness for remote learning, once again some of our children have had to isolate and have continued to access their learning online. Our staff have been incredible. They have changed and adapted seamlessly to ensure that all our children get the best that we can offer. Half term is a welcome break, and we hope that this will give things a chance to settle down ready to come back for the busy and exciting term that leads us up to Christmas.

Covid cases nationally and locally are going up again. Schools are seeing large numbers of cases (there are quite a few kids and staff out at St. Jo's). The reproduction rate R is just above 1.0, and will probably increase further as we move indoors for the winter. NYMPSFIELD PARISH COUNCIL

A busy couple of months have seen interest in developing the bus shelter as a location to site vending machines for milk and milk products. This is against the background of a firm refusal by the bus company to take the bus as far as the bus shelter, now or in the future. The vending machine initiative might turn out to be a valuable resource for the community and make a positive use of the shelter. Discussions are ongoing and no final decision has been made.

High on the agenda have been; support for the campaign to resist the closure of Uley medical practice, getting to grips with supporting initiatives for climate action locally and supporting an initiative to improve play facilities at the village playing field. The Uley practice appears safe for 12 months and we will be following developments closely. The parish council will be inviting residents with interest in forming a local climate action group to come forward. Rosie Hughes and Ava Clements were invited to join a walk round the village with the CEO of Stroud DC and District Councillor Piercy. There was discussion around the difficulty of pedestrian access from the village to the playing field and possible improvements. NPC have encouraged Rosie and Ava's initiative and offered ideas for funding – this is an ongoing process! Defibrillator Training - at time of going to press we have received interest from 5 people

- meaning we have up to 7 places left to fill. This is your chance to attend a highly subsidised course which will equip you to effectively deal with a cardiac arrest situation and perhaps save the life of a loved one. The course lasts 3.5 hours, is available to Nympsfield residents of 16 years or older, and will cost £20 per person.
