#### OLD NEWS FROM NYMPSFIELD

**Winds of Change** 

Professor Lord Peter Hennessy (born 1947), journalist, historian of British politics, academic and prolific author was made a life peer in 2010 taking the title Baron Hennessy of Nympsfield. In 2019 he published a book on Britain in the Early Sixties ("Winds of Change") which begins with "A Tale of Two Cotswolds", a prelude set in the 1960s in which life in a back-ofbeyond Nympsfield is contrasted with the secret establishment of a government Cold War bolthole in a disused underground stone mine not far from Bath. The book goes on to describe the final days of the series of Conservative governments that, starting with Churchill in 1951 successively passed to Eden, Macmillan and, finally, Douglas-Home before losing the 1964 General Election to Harold Wilson's Labour Party. "Thirteen years of Tory misrule" was Labour's mantra, a phrase I heard on Labour lips recently - I doubt it will catch on this time. The obsession of the day – for both parties – was Britain's low industrial productivity and sub-par economic growth. Does it sound familiar? Wilson's chosen solution to these quandaries was to fire "the white heat of the technological revolution"; it never happened. The Conservatives of the day, soon to be led by Edward Heath, had a different idea: membership of the

European Economic Community. That did happen - eventually - but we don't want to open that can of worms, this is a family paper.



The Hennessys came to Nympsfield in 1959 from Finchley in north London when Peter was just twelve. The Hennessy are of Irish extraction and the existence of a Catholic community here was a major attraction to them. According to "Winds of Change", Hennessy senior had thoughts of selfsufficiency - in vegetables at least and they rented Bell Court. Going back to the war years, the house had been poorly maintained and divided vertically into two. In the front half (with the prized plastered ceiling) were Ted Poulton and his sister Lizzie; in the back Mr and Mrs Selby. In 1948 the house was bought from the Leigh estate by a family called Chapman - he was a librarian in Oxford. They converted it back from two cottages to

one and upgraded it sufficiently to live there until the cold and damp persuaded them to allow Mike and Tessa Watts to stay there as caretakers while they continued building their house at Sheepcotes. Peter Hennessy attests that, with its fierce draughts, Bell Court was cold even in summer. When his family left in 1965, Paul and Bettina Mack moved in.

In 1959 the village was still a working community with four farms in the village itself (Court and Street farms plus the two smallholdings of Donald Mills and Michael Watts) not to mention two more in the wider parish (Tinkley and Field farms). In addition there was an outpost of Lister's factory on Back Street that had opened during World War II. Here sheep shears were assembled for sale in Australia. The employees there were required to be married ladies although an exception was made for Miss Herbert who looked after her mother. Later, the building became home to the Nympsfeilde

Press before being demolished to make way for the two Print House cottages. Finally, there was a bacon factory behind (what is now) The Old Post Office on Front Street.

Prof Hennessy's book tells of the severe winter of 1962-63 when snow came on Boxing Day and stayed until March. Supplies of food ran low and the local council sent an army lorry with four-wheel drive through the snow to re-stock the village shop. He recalls going up into the attic of Bell Court and seeing his father in bed surrounded by a foot of snow! He also admits to being a "swot" who wanted to get back into school, to which end he trudged through the snow, clad in a duffel coat (and probably short trousers), along Tinkley Lane to Nailsworth so as to catch the bus to Marling School in Stroud.

Accompanying him was a fellow pupil - an unspecified Wooldridge – most likely, this was Frank.

Even in the early 20th century there were people who commuted to work from Nympsfield. What changed in the intervening years were the numbers doing this and the distances travelled. Push bike to Dursley morphed to motor car to Gloucester. But, post pandemic, with people logging in to work online or working from home for themselves, perhaps it's becoming a hive of industry once again. I'd like to think so, for all kinds of reasons.

Later on, Maggie rented a house on Tinkley Corner and looked after Bill, who in later life looked after his mother.

For many years Maggie would take in a homeless person until they found their feet: a really good lady.

Maggie will always be remembered as a really kind soul and I think she should be remembered as one of Nympsfield's finest.

#### **Woodchester Park Expands**

The National Trust has extended its holdings at Woodchester Park by purchasing the 56 acre 'Thistledown Farm' on Tinkley Lane. This area was part of the original park formed by Sir George Huntley of Frocester around 1619. The Trust's intention is to improve access and create some shorter, easier walks into the valley as well as linking up to with already existing paths. As reported in the Stroud News and Journal, the former owners, Richard and Kate, said

"We know, in time, the National Trust will continue to allow the general public to access the land, to enjoy and share the beauty of the farm, as we have.

"We also trust they will care for the land with a similar ethos and long term vision as we have had, and have the funds needed to continue to invest in it."

The Trust expressed its gratitude to Richard and Kate for all the conservation work carried out by them at Thistledown and said it would ensure their hard work can continue to be enjoyed by everyone.

The new site will open to visitors later in the year.

#### **Nature Notes from Miss Daisy**

LADYBIRDS (or LADYBUGS)

The Ladybird is one of our most loved insects with their attractive appearance – and of course because they are so effective in ridding our gardens of destructive aphids. During their lifetime a single Ladybird can eat as many as 5,000 aphids. There are many different species in the UK, but the one which is the most recognisable is the one with the red body with seven black spots. They are easily visible to their predators but their scarlet colour is a reminder that they taste bitter, so birds etc. tend to leave them alone.

An adult Ladybird can live for up to three years, and they overwinter from October to February in dry sheltered crevices, such as tree bark and they like to huddle together in groups. Unfortunately the Harlequin Ladybird which was introduced from Asia, and is now very common in the UK, eats the larvae of other Ladybirds, as well as aphids.

Did you know that Ladybirds have been in outer space? NASA sent a few in 1999,

along with some aphids, as an experiment to see if the aphids could escape their predators in zero gravity.

Many of you will have heard the children's nursery rhyme about Ladybirds:

"Ladybird, Ladybird, fly away home Your house is on fire and your children are gone

All except Little Ann, and she hid under the baking pan."

There are many different versions to this, but it is rather a macabre verse for young children.

It is understood to have been first published in a Children's Nursery Rhyme book, along with many other favourites, such as "Baa Baa Black Sheep" as far back as 1744.

The collective name for Ladybirds is a "Loveliness", which is just perfect for these beautiful little creatures, who hold such a special place in our affections and who do a grand job in keeping our gardens free of aphids.

#### **School News**

It is nearly February half term already, the Spring Term is flying by – thank goodness that we seem to be getting a break from the rain.

The year started with some great news for us and what a way to begin the year, being placed 7<sup>th</sup> out of 500 schools in the South West and 138<sup>th</sup> Nationally out of something like 37,000 primary schools. This is a testament to how incredibly hard all of the staff and children work here at St Joseph's and the great support that our

parents give us. Thank you for your support in sharing this great news.

The weather was against us when our choir sang for anyone who was able to make it before Christmas. I think it was a bit too icy for many to venture out. Some of our parents were able to come and enjoyed the children singing. Hopefully as the weather improves we will be able to find further opportunities to invite you into school to share some of the things that the children are getting up to!

Things are certainly back to normal and that includes all of the sports tournaments. St Joseph's have historically done well at Cross country. This year though, we were moved from the small school category to

compete against Big Schools. However, that did not deter our competitive runners. The club is supported by Miss Berry (our reception teacher) but planned and organised by 2 incredibly committed parents Mr Britton and Mrs Pinnock. Across the course of the season, the runners have improved their personal bests and worked really hard to be the best that they can be – and when all of the results were drawn together – they did brilliantly.

The junior boys team came 3<sup>rd</sup>, the Junior Girls team came 2nd, so did the Senior Girls, The Senior Boys team won!

There were top 10 placings in every race. Instead, bookmark your favourite sites, or type the URL into your browser bar. Also be sceptical of adverts that claim to change how popular sites and services work. They are usually scams.
