

Nature Notes from Miss Daisy

CAT TAILS

Our cat had me up early this morning as she wanted some food – and as I was opening one of her "little pouches" of food to put in her dish, it got me thinking; how times have changed.......

When I was a child – which I admit was more than half a century ago now – we had a dog and a cat.

Mother used to get their food from the local grocer – a tin of "Doggomeat" for the dog, and a tin of "Kattomeat" for the cat – tho apart from the name and the appropriate picture on the tin, there appeared to be little difference as both dog and cat would have their food side by side in relative harmony. Halfway through, at some sort of invisible signal, they would swap over and demolish the remains of their neighbour's food with gusto.

Rumour has it that one of our neighbours at the time used a tin of "Doggomeat" to make her husband a meat pie, which (unknowingly) he deemed "delicious" but then times were hard in the fifties.

Nowadays pet food is big industry – supermarket aisles dedicated to rows and rows of "gourmet dishes" with names like Whiskas, Felix, or if you want to be more "upmarket" – Sheba.

They boast of mouth-watering salmon in a delicious sauce, steamed trout, tender beef and vegetables in gravy, and I even saw something labelled "cat milk" the other day – now what on earth is that about? There are cat treats with such names as "Sensations" and "Dreamies" and I wonder how long it took a board-room of top executives to dream up those.

Of course we love our pets – but half of all cats are now obese, and no wonder, as they lay in their fur lined baskets waiting for one of their "servants" to tear open another pouch of their favourite recipe. It is big business for vets to prescribe special diet food for cats and you can even buy a cat treadmill - the image of a cat on an exercise bike came into my mind but I quickly dismissed it – for therein lies madness!!

The other day I was in the cat food aisle looking at all the different varieties now available – I turned to a

lady next to me and said "This is ridiculous – maybe we should bring the cat in to make their own choice....and do you know what, I expect most of them would prefer "mouse" flavour"

She went away smiling – I hope you are doing the same.

GARDENING for WILDLIFE

Peat-free compost

In 2024 it will no longer be possible to buy bagged compost containing peat. Over the past few years compost producers have been active in improving and refining the quality of peat-free. It is still quite variable, though, and it can be difficult to know which brand to buy. Some are more favoured than others by such bodies as RHS and Gardener's World. For more information see

If you're still unsure, it might be worth buying one bag to start with to see if it does the job. The general consensus is that spending a bit more pays off in the end. Some people get together to buy an expensive brand by the pallet, to share, and some make their own mixes.

Open Gardens 20th & 21st May

These gardens have been assessed for their wildlife-friendliness by WildStroud, one of whom is an ecologist, and some have been awarded bronze, silver or gold status. They're all different and many are works in progress. They're in Stroud and in the district, including Nailsworth, Stonehouse and Woodchester.
